GAZE SPOTLIGHT ON QUEER LATIN CINEMA

GAZE has always curated the best international arthouse and foreign language LGBT films. In recent years nowhere has impressed more than Latin America, with its sumptuous narratives depicting queer life — its scathing critiques of LGBT oppression, its socially realistic dramas and its fantastisical experiments in arthouse filmmaking; all independently articulating the spectrum of LGBT life across the region.

Latin content particularly came to the fore at the 2018 festival, with screenings of films including the multi-award-winning *The Heiresses*, *Hard Paint* and *Tranny Fag*, following on from countless other offerings throughout the curatorial history of the festival. 2019 proved a continuation of this upward trend, and this year we shine a spotlight on some Latin delights, with tantalizing cinematic treats from countries including Argentina, Brazil, Columbia and Venezuela. These bring together vastly different story forms, narrative styles and emotional responses.

The five outstanding feature films screening in the series are:

SOCRATES

Friday 2nd August, 4.30pm, pg.29

Socrates is a captivating and compelling character study depicting a teenage orphan's attempts to face his grief, his sexuality, and the cruel hardships of life in the wake of his mother's tragic passing.



A GIRL'S BAND

Friday 2nd August, 10.30pm, pg.35 A furious, uproarious furore documenting the Buenos Aires feminist punk scene, *A Girl's Band* administers a scorthing commentary on homophobia, toxic masculinity and the patriarchal nature of Argentinian society.

THE BLOND ONE

Saturday 3rd August, 6:00pm, pg.45 A quietly erotic and sexually-charged drama, *The Blond One* provides a introspective and accurate account of a friendship transitioning to something more.

BRIEF STORY FROM THE GREEN PLANET

Saturday 3rd August, 10.45pm, pg.50 Brief Story From The Green Planet is a bizarre, brilliant and totally bonkers adventure following three outsiders tasked with returning an alien back to its home planet.

BEING IMPOSSIBLE

Sunday 4th August, 1.30pm, pg.53 Sensitively portrayed and expertly crafted, Being Impossible is a film about a woman's journey of self-discovery when it is revealed to her that she is intersex.

Short films from Latin America are also represented across our shorts programmes, including:

The World is Round So That Nobody Can Hide In The Corners from Brazil (Iris Prize Shorts, pg.71), and *Carlito Leaves Forever* (Men's Shorts, pg. 41) from Peru. **RG.**



Each year GAZE showcases the finest of the festival through our GAZE on Tour programme. We are committed to presenting the best of classic and contemporary LGBT film regionally — providing Irish communities outside of Dublin access to queer filmic content. Internationally, we engage in cultural exchanges of Irish LGBT film, particularly in the proliferation of our Irish shorts programmes, which have screened around the world; at Irish film festivals abroad, embassies and consulates, and through Irish LGBT film series at international queer film festivals.

Recent screenings have included outings in Sydney and Melbourne, as part of Irish Film Festival Australia, Sofia Pride Film Festival, Bulgaria (presented in association with the Embassy of Ireland, Sofia) and Bucharest Pride Festival, Romania (presented in association with the Embassy of Ireland, Bucharest), with additional screenings planned for Thailand later in the year.

Following on from our partnership with IFI International in 2018, we are delighted to continue this programme for the 2019/2020 season, through the exhibition of our 2019 Irish shorts programme, and the curation of Irish LGBT film series overseas.

GAZE Film Festival are delighted to be partnering with the IFI's Education Department and BeLonG To Youth Services on a special 15-18's screening of *Handsome Devil*, and a Q&A with writer/ director John Butler. Returning to boarding school after the holidays, Ned, a bullied but resilient outsider, is dismayed to find he has been assigned a new roommate, Conor, a rugby-playing Adonis.

When Conor is drafted by Ned's prime tormentors, the animosity between them deepens, until English teacher Mr Sherry insists they work together on a variety show duet. An unlikely friendship develops, complicated by desire, and the need to find one's own voice. John Butler's tender tale fits the classic coming-of-age/ coming-out mould with equal measures of comedy and drama peppering the road to self-acceptance. Featuring a 1980s indie soundtrack, a top-notch cast and some damn fine rugby, the film is an absolute gem. **AT**.

As a core value of GAZE, we endeavour to share with our audience important works of queer filmic history, and deep cuts from the annals of gay representation in cinena. This year we bring a special 100th anniversary screening of Different from the Others, the first known depiction of gay characters on screen.

An early film of the Weimar era, it is an earnest and surprisingly progressive portrayal of two gay musicians falling in love, who find themselves embroiled in a malicious blackmail scandal — providing a scathing commentary to the oppression of the time. A priceless gem of LGBT visual history, the film was made as a reaction to Germany's Paragraph 175 law, which made homosexuality a criminal offence. Thought to be the first pro-gay film ever produced, it's subversive and clandestine depiction of homosexual love was thought lost for decades, before it's eventual re-discovery in post-Nazi Germany. **RG.**

Our *Festival Friends* are such an important part of the Festival that this year we launch our very first Festival Friends screening. The film voted for by the Festival Friends is *My Beautiful Laundrette*.

The film launched the screen career of actor Daniel Day-Lewis, and established a new way of portraying gay and Asian characters in British drama. Ostensibly a rites-of-passage story about a young Asian man's entry into the hard world of Thatcherite enterprise, the film has never been equalled for its complex portrayal of characters who are usually represented in polarised form. Best of all are the performances of Jaffrey, as the boy's businessman uncle, and Shirley Anne Field as his mistress — these two truly embody all the contradictions which the film sets out to explore. **AT**.



<u>THE GAZE JURY</u> 2019

Zorian Clayton

Zorian Clayton is a curator at the Victoria & Albert Museum in London, specialising in posters and queer art history. He also co-chairs the LGBTQ Working Group of the V&A. He began working with film festivals at the Commonwealth Festival in Manchester in 2003, which led to working with the Cork Film Festival, the BBC, and in documentary film production for French television. He joined the BFI Flare Festival team as a programmer in 2016.

Kate Dolan

Part of the Irish Times 'Top 50 to Watch in 2019', Kate Dolan is one of Ireland's most exciting emerging filmmaking talents. Two of her short films have screened at GAZE; *Little Doll*, which premiered as part of Generation Kplus at Berlinale 2016, and the Screen Ireland funded Catcalls, which has played at many festivals all over the world since it's premiere at the Cork Film Festival in 2017. Most recently, she was selected for Screen Ireland's inaugural POV scheme with the feature horror script *You Are Not My Mother*.



Aine Macken

Aine Macken is a Dublin based artist, curator and event coordinator. She has exhibited throughout Ireland and in the UK, including numerous group shows, street art projects in Stoneybatter with Dublin City Council through Dublin Canvas and solo shows in Monstertruck Gallery & Studios (Dublin), The Greenroom Gallery (Cork), and Pallas Contemporary Projects (Dublin). Her curatorial projects include Art Clash, Stargaze Indoor Arts Festival at D-Light Studios (Dublin), Dublin Pride Official Art Exhibition and Never Never and Elsewhere in The Exchange (Dublin).

Tonie Walsh

Noted civil rights activist and former president of the National LGBT Federation, Tonie Walsh, is an archivist, writer, and the founding editor of GCN, Ireland's most successful queer publication. He is the founder of the Irish Queer Archive which was transferred to state ownership in 2008. A longtime advocate for improved sexual health strategies, he declared his HIV Poz status in a Facebook 'manifesto' marking World AIDS Day in 2015. He recently premiered his one-man show, I Am Tonie Walsh, at Dublin's Project Arts Centre. He told GAZE he's an incurable romantic.

Socrates, a handsome and hard-working young man regularly fills-in for his mother at her cleaning job when she's unable to work due to illness. Life isn't easy, but they manage. But after her sudden death, Socrates is placed in legal purgatory — no adult guardians, but not yet old enough to live independently.

Struggling to get by, he develops an intense connection with another young man at a local junkyard. A powerful and confident debut by director Alex Moratto, *Socrates* received international acclaim upon its release, with Independent Spirit Award nominations, including for the stunning central performance by Christian Malheiros as the young man burdened with life's hardships all too soon. **SMCG.**

Set against the glorious and glacial Italian Apennine mountains, *Zen in the Ice Rift* is a coming-of-age story unafraid to be bold, brutal and achingly sincere.

Centring on non-binary teenager Zen, the character first appears as cold and icy as the backdrop to their experience, finding their only solace in the local hockey team an external and physical outlet for their internal rage. Building a strong barrier to repel the constant abuse and bullying they endure at school and hockey practice, Zen is resolved to maintain this steely veneer in defense of their authentic self. However, when Vanessa, a popular girl who feels similarly misunderstood and alone, becomes drawn to Zen, the two begin an unlikely friendship, one which explores gender identity and sexual fluidity, and reflects an honest and disarmingly genuine portrait of youth on the margins. For many of us who still bristle at the memory of obligatory team sports at school, *Light in the Water* is a wonderful antidote: an inspiring and uplifting tale of friendship and love through sports.

In 1982, what is now known as West Hollywood Aquatics was created, an inclusive swim team that was a solace for so many LGBT people in Los Angeles. A truly heart-warming story of unity and triumph over adversity, West Hollywood Aquatics overcame homophobia, the tragedy of AIDS and injustices by major sports organisations to create the Gay Games, the international LGBT sports competition that is still going strong today. Featuring interviews with members and rich archive footage of the early days, Light in the Water is a touching and emotional documentary that will inspire you to joyously dive back into the pool. With the exponential rise of the web series, the form has become synonymous with queer content - perhaps a correlation with the DIY ethos long associated with the LGBT community. Not yet available to stream online in Ireland, GAZE is delighted to present Anne+, fresh from Tribeca Film Festival's NOW section the festival's dedicated section, which presents new online work from independent storytellers who choose to create and share their work in the online space.

A quintessential millennial story told through six standalone episodes, the *Anne+* series traverses the many miscellaneous relationships and exploits of the titular character as she finds her way in the world, learning from each new experience, and reflecting on the diverse women who have had an influence on her. **RG**.

But amidst the thrill of hedonism is a pain that can't be satisfied through sex or drugs. With his ever-loving mother by his side, *Jonathan Agassi Saved My Life* is a searing and shocking documentary, handled with sensitivity by master documentarian Tomer Heymann, never shying away from the reality of what it means to live constantly in the extreme. **SMCG.**

In this documentary, his nephew Robert Clift and co-director Hillary Demmon reexamine Monty's life, and the many flawed narratives that have come to define him.
